The cost of an effeciency cottage is less than our traditional build program because of the smaller square footage (600-800 sq ft) and building on the land the homeowner already owns with existing utility connections.

These stick-built homes are energy effecient and resilient to future storms.

Cynthia's story



Prior to Hurricane Florence, Cynthia and her dog, Winston, lived in an aging mobile home on Honeysuckle Lane in Pender County. She remembers the many times she stepped out of the shower onto a cold floor in a house that just couldn't seem to keep the heat in. Still, she was thankful that at least she had a roof over her head.

After the storm, Cynthia's home became completely unlivable. She joined Cape Fear Habitat's ReBuild program and found her new beginning. She moved into an on-site trailer while working alongside Habitat staff and volunteers to build her new home, which everyone began calling "the Honeysuckle Cottage."

"I've grown to love them," Cynthia said about Habitat volunteers. "They saved me. I don't think I would have made it through another winter in my house. I really, really don't. This will be the first winter in many years I'll have heat," she said. "I'm just grateful to have a safe place to live, a warm place to live."

Today, Cynthia is happily moved into her new home and celebrated with her two daughters and grandson.
